PWC Honored with National Award for Reliable Electric Operations

PWC Maintains Diamond Level, the highest RP₃ designation

PWC has received the Reliable Public Power Provider™ (RP₃) award for providing consumers with the highest degree of reliable and safe electric service. Of the 82 Public Power utilities recognized by the American Public Power Association, PWC was one of only three to receive Diamond Level, the highest designation.

This is PWC's third Diamond Level designation, having first won the award in 2007 and again in 2009. PWC provides electric service to over 77,000 customers in the Fayetteville/Cumberland County area and is the largest Public Power provider in North Carolina and the 35th largest in the United States.

"These RP₃ designated utilities should be proud," said Paul Allen, vice president, engineering at Nashville Tennessee Electric Service and chair of APPA's RP₃ Review Panel, "They stand out as utilities that are continuing to strive for excellence for their customers and their communities."

The RP₃ recognizes public power utilities that demonstrate proficiency in four key disciplines:

reliability, safety, workforce development and system improvement. Criteria within each category are based on sound business practices and represent a utility-wide commitment to safe and reliable delivery of electricity. Some of PWC's highlights include:

- PWC was 100 percent compliant in all areas following its first audit by the Southeastern Electric Reliability Council (SERC). The review process ensures PWC is meeting standards and regulations put in place by the federal government.
- PWC has an excellent safety record and safety awards earned by PWC during 2010 included: NC Department of Labor's "Certificate for Safety Achievement" award for the 22nd consecutive year; APPA's "Electric Utility Safety Award" for the 19th consecutive year; Electricities of North Carolina's "Municipal Electric Safety Award" for the 14th consecutive year and the National Safety Council's "Occupational Excellence Achievement Award".



Hurricane Season is Here and PWC is Ready, Weather or Not!

June 1 kicked off hurricane season and PWC wants you to be prepared for potential storms or other emergencies that cause utility outages. Here are some tips to better prepare you and your family:

Must Do:

- Have an emergency plan if someone in your household relies on electrically powered life support.
- Keep emergency supplies such as flashlights and extra batteries in a place that's easily accessible in the dark. (see following for suggestions)
- When storing water, be sure to use clean containers.
- Locate the main electric fuse box, water service main and natural gas main. Learn how and when to turn these utilities off.

Put a Family Emergency Kit in Place

- A three-day supply of water (one gallon per person per day) and food that won't spoil
- One change of clothing and footwear per person, and one blanket or sleeping bag per person
- A first aid kit that includes your family's prescription medications
- Emergency tools including a battery-powered radio, flashlight and plenty of extra batteries
- An extra set of car keys and a credit card, cash or traveler's checks
- Sanitation supplies
- Special items for infant, elderly or disabled family members
- An extra pair of glasses
- Keep important family documents in a water proof container. Keep a smaller kit in the trunk of your car

Do We Have Your Correct Contact Information?

During utility emergencies, it may be necessary to notify customers of important information. One way we can do this is by broadcasting a phone message to you. If your phone number is not current in your PWC file, you may not get timely information. Having your updated phone number is also helpful when reporting an

emergency. Our system automatically recognizes your phone number and identifies your service location, so we can begin the process to restore your services as quickly as possible.

Tackle the Five Biggest Energy Guzzlers in Your Home

To make a sizable dent in your home's energy consumption and your energy bills - start at the top. In general, appliances that heat or cool are going to be the biggest energy guzzlers in your house, so tackle them first.

1. Heating and Cooling Systems

Energy use: 45% of a home's total energy cost*

Ways to save: Dial down your heater and dial up your air conditioner by two degrees. Install a programmable thermostat. Clean filters monthly. Seal all ductwork.

If you're shopping:

Select the highest efficient rating you can afford.

Compare warranties and performance ratings. Choose units that automatically adjust blower volume. Pair a new system with a programmable thermostat.



2. Water Heaters

Energy Use: 11% of a home's total energy cost*

Ways to save: Dial down water temperature to 120 degrees. Add an insulating heater blanket. Regularly drain water from the bottom of the tank to reduce mineral buildup.

If you're shopping: The storage tank is the most common model, but tankless, solar and other options are also available. Look for high-efficient ratings and solid warranties.

3. Clothes Washers and Dryers

Energy Use: 10% of a home's total energy costs*

Ways to save: Only run full loads. Make sure the moisture sensor or thermostat is working so loads don't over-dry. Clean the lint trap each time.

If you're shopping: Buy the highest efficient rating you can afford. Select the standard full-size capacity unless your family is very large. Choose a moisture sensor feature over a thermostat.



4. Refrigerators

Energy Use: 6% of a home's energy use*

Ways to save: Keep your refrigerator full. Keep coils clean on older models. Defrost the freezer unit. Get rid of units older than 10 years - they cost twice as much to operate.

If you're shopping: Select a unit with the highest efficient rating you can afford. Match size to your family's current and projected needs. Select features you'll realistically use such as an ice dispenser; skip expensive add-ons.

5. Dishwashers

Energy Use: 2% of your household's energy costs*

Ways to save: Let dishes air dry. Keep the filter clean for efficient operation.

Only run full loads.

If you're shopping: Choose a high-efficient unit that has low water consumption. Compare noise levels among units. Soil sensor features enhance cleaning performance.

Tip: As a rule, appliances that are 10 years old or older are less efficient than newer models. If you're replacing appliances, always look for the Energy Star label to ensure the best efficiency rating.
