Safety Tip from the Field



Hi! I'm Justin and I'm an Electric Substation Technician at Fayetteville PWC. Substations are located throughout our community to help distribute a safe and reliable electricity supply to homes and businesses. Substations come in different sizes, carry different voltages and are all extremely dangerous if not respected properly. I want to share some helpful safety tips that will keep you and your loved ones out of harm's way:

- Always observe all danger signs around substations and never attempt to gain access.
- Never enter the fenced area around an electric substation.
 Obey the warning signs alerting you to the high voltage area and stay away. If something such as a ball, kite or other item goes inside the fence, call PWC immediately at 1-877-OUR-PWC1 (687-7921).
- Don't attempt to break into a substation for any reason.
 Significant damage can occur which will ultimately impact electric customers. Contact local police if you see anyone trying to enter a substation unlawfully.

Our employees will never call to ask you for financial information over the phone nor do they collect payment in person.

Conserve Energy as the Weather

Gets Cooler The average American family spends
approximately \$1,300 a year on utility

approximately \$1,300 a year on utility bills. As cooler autumn

weather approaches you may find yourself spending more to stay warm than you really need to. Energy saving tips can help you make small yet meaningful changes that will keep the cold air out and save you money.

- Seal Leaks: Heat gets sucked away through drafty windows, electrical outlets, light switches and other interior openings. Install foam gaskets behind outlets and switches to keep heat inside. Close unused outlets with plastic safety caps. Use caulk to seal openings around windows, and make sure your windows are locked to keep heat inside.
- Add weather stripping around your entry doors. Heat can easily leak out through the spacing surrounding the doorway. This will instantly eliminate cold drafts.
- Chimney: Fall is the perfect time to inspect the chimney in preparation for the first fire of the season. Hire a professional chimney sweep once a year to clean away soot and creosote, which can cause a fire. Chimney sweeps will also inspect your flue, vent systems, and pipes to make sure everything is connected and free of rust.


• Furnace: You should schedule an appointment with a licensed heating and air conditioning technician to inspect your furnace before you need to turn it on to heat your home. The technician will make sure that there are no gas leaks and that everything is in working order. Be sure to replace filters regularly. If you need a new furnace you should consider buying one that is rated 90% or higher in energy efficiency. Replacing an old furnace with a more energy-efficient model can result in up to 30% savings!  Insulation: Installing insulation can be the cheapest way to make the most impact when it comes to energy savings.
 Be sure to lay insulation in the basement, attic, and crawl space. You can also blow insulation into the inside of your exterior walls to retain heat during colder months.

City Rolls Out Employee Recognition Program

Do you know a city employee who deserves special recognition? Recently the City of Fayetteville began a program to recognize excellence in their workforce. Citizens, as well as employees, can nominate full-time, part-time or temporary City employees for the Core Values Award (CVA). Winners will be selected twice a year to be honored at the Service Awards Ceremony held in January and July.

The Core Values are part of the City's Strategic Plan each year which says that employees will serve with RESPECT: responsibility, ethics, stewardship, professionalism, entrepreneurial spirit, commitment, teamwork. Nominations are based on showing how an employee or group of employees excelled on the job in one or more of these.
