Naughty or Nice Holiday Safety List

As you make your lists and check them twice, here is one to keep your holiday celebrations safe and wonderful.

Nice

- Water your Christmas tree daily to keep it hydrated and reduce your risk of fire.
- Make sure all lights and decorations have the UL seal and be sure anything electrical used outdoors is labeled for outdoor use.
- Keep all decorations, including Christmas trees, at least three feet away from heating equipment or an open flame.
- Turn off all indoor and outdoor electrical decorations and heating equipment before leaving home or going to bed. Consider using an automatic timer to ensure that lights are not left on by mistake.
- Always unplug electrical decorations before replacing bulbs or fuses.
- Always follow manufactures' instructions and use products as they were intended regarding indoor or outdoor use.
- Remember to plug outdoor decorations into outlets protected by Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters (GFCIs) to prevent shock.

Naughty

- Never attempt to extend the length of an extension cord by connecting it with another extension cord. Use an extension cord that is long enough to meet your needs.
- Never use frayed or damaged cords or light strands.
- Never run an extension cord under a rug or positioned so that it's pinched by furniture.
- Never decorate a tree that is in contact with a power line and keep ladders away from power lines when handling outdoor decorations.
- Never place electrical decorations near water.

Make Heat Pumps Work for You

Heat Pumps are the most efficient form of electric heating in moderate climates like ours. Heat pumps use little electricity because instead of "making" heat, the system's refrigerant absorbs heat from the air outside (even when it's cold, outside air contains a certain amount of heat) and releases it to warm your home.

With cold weather looming, these useful tips will help you save power and money on your bills as you heat your home.

- Keep your heat at 68° when you're home. Turn it down at night or when you're out. A programmable thermostat will help. Read about our new Thermostat Incentive Program in the margin!
- Turn up your heat gradually no more than two degrees at a time to keep your heat pump's auxiliary heat from coming on. Auxiliary heat costs three times as much to operate, but keep in mind that auxiliary heat will come on automatically if temperatures get to or below freezing.
- If your heat pump is more than 10 years old, consider replacing it with a more efficient ENERGY STAR® certified system. PWC customers can take advantage of our incentive program and earn up to \$400 for installing an ENERGY STAR heat pump, plus additional credits for replacing duct work and/or improving insulation.

As a Public Power community, Fayetteville benefits from having its own local municipal electric system. In addition to the benefits of local leadership, greater reliability and faster response, PWC provides a significant financial benefit to our community. Annually, PWC has over a \$100 million impact on our local economy; providing local jobs and purchasing local goods and services, while making contributions to the City of Fayetteville to support the General Fund.

The 2019-2020 PWC Annual Financial Report was presented in October and noted, in 2020, PWC contributed \$17+ million to support the city's general fund including a payment in lieu of taxes (\$11 million), streetlight services (\$3.9 million), economic development (\$1.2 million) and COVID-19 Emergency funds (\$1 million). Over the last 5 years, PWC's total impact to the city's general fund was over \$77 million.

"When you hear PWC described as Fayetteville's Hometown Utility, it goes well beyond providing safe, reliable utility services," said Wade Fowler, PWC Chairman, following the financial presentation. "PWC is an asset to our community in many ways. In addition to last year's payment in lieu of taxes, we invest in making our community stronger by supporting the city with over \$5 million of streetlight services, economic development support, and even COVID-19 Emergency funds, that would not have been possible, without having local ownership/control."
