Trap It, Then Toss It and Keep Wipes Out of the Pipes!

Smart food disposal and refraining from putting items labeled "flushable" down the drain can help protect our environment, our sources of drinking water and your own property. Dumping grease, fats and oil is not only illegal, but it can also cause

sewage back-ups and flooding. Wipes labeled
"flushable" don't break down in the system
and can also cause blockages that lead to
sewage back-ups and can damage personal
and public property. Do your part to
prevent such accidents by following
these guidelines for proper food
disposal. Trap your grease, fat and oil and

DON'T dump cooking oil, poultry fat and grease into the kitchen sink or the toilet bowl.

then toss it in the garbage!

DON'T depend on heavy-duty drain cleaners to fix a grease clog. These cleaners do not melt the grease. Grease re-solidifies inside sewer lines and causes blockages.

DO dispose of fats, grease and oils properly. Pour cooled fat, grease and used cooking oil into a disposable container (empty plastic food containers work well) and put it in the garbage.

You can also pick up a free Fat Trapper, a reusable plastic container with foil bags, to collect grease – available anytime at the PWC Customer Service Center located at 955 Old Wilmington Road.

DO use paper towels to wipe residual grease or oil off of dishes, pots and pans prior to washing them. Always remember, the following items should NEVER be flushed down the toilet:

- Wipes labelled "flushable" (they don't break down in the system)
- Baby wipes
- Diapers
- Paper towels
- Dental floss
- Medical waste
- Kitty litter
- Feminine hygiene products



Temperature Drops Make Energy Use Go Up

Cold weather has a significant impact on winter electric bills especially when the temperature drops below 32 degrees. Our winter weather has already been significantly colder than last year with temps about 30% cooler than 12 months ago.

Outdoor temperatures are the leading cause for driving up home energy usage and bills. Learn how to lower your bill with Time-of-Use Off-Peak rates and see our Conservation Specialists Tips on the back for facts and tips that can help you save.

With our coldest temperatures occurring in the morning hours and driving up energy use, shift as much energy use (such as laundry) and take advantage of Off-Peak Time-of-Use rates!

Check Out This Month's Tip from Our Conservationists!

Our Conservation Specialists are experts in saving water and energy year-round, and their tips will help you save energy, save money, and stay comfortable during the cold winter months.

Most customers in our area heat and cool their home with heat pumps. It's important to understand how heat pumps work to better manage your bill.

- Heat pumps pull air from outside of your home and transfer
 it inside to heat your home up to the desired thermostat
 setting. So colder temperatures make a big impact. Adjust
 your thermostat by no more than one-two degrees at a time
 to prevent your system from automatically forcing the auxiliary/
 emergency heat system to start running. Auxiliary heat costs
 three times as much to operate and comes on automatically if
 temperatures get to or below freezing.
- As you're adjusting your thermostat remember, the greater
 the difference between the outside temperature and what you
 set inside -- the more energy you will use and the more costly your bill will be.

Also, preventing frozen pipes when temperatures drop is key to saving you a potential headache in the future:

- Close your home's foundation vents to reduce the circulation of cold air underneath your home.
- Protect your irrigation system's backflow prevention device. Insulate the inside of the cover and protect the pipes to prevent freezing.

Public Power at Work!

As a Public Power community, Fayetteville benefits from having its own local municipal electric system. Across the U.S., Public Power rates are traditionally lower than Investor-owned utilities and PWC electric rates are the lowest in the Fayetteville/ Cumberland County area.

In May, 2020, PWC reduced electric Time-of-Use rates for residential, small and medium power customers by 4.7%.

Off-Peak electric rate per kilowatt hour was decreased from 9.1 cents to 8.4 cents and apply 148 hours or 88% during an average week (non-holiday). The rate reduction came as a result of a contract re-negotiation with Duke Energy which provided PWC customers \$33 million in savings. While the changes did not begin until January 2021, providing the savings to customers was of the utmost importance to the PWC Board. As a result, the rate decrease began in May, 2020 and customers began saving nine months sooner.

This rate decrease puts real value on what it means to our community having PWC as its hometown utility," said Evelyn Shaw, PWC Chair at the time of the action. "PWC is not-for-profit and we are able to take the savings of the new contract and give it



back to rate payers, instead of shareholders. It's one of many ways we benefit our community and demonstrates our commitment as the hometown utility.

With new contract terms, PWC expects to save \$313 million (net present value savings) through 2042, including the \$33 million savings prior to 2024 when the terms of the current agreement end.
