


PWC receives Two National Awards for Financial Reporting

PWC recently received national recognition for financial reporting with two awards from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA). The first award was for the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award, the highest form of recognition given for governmental budgeting by the GFOA. This is the 29th consecutive time PWC has received this award. In May, PWC was awarded the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for the July 2022 to June 2023 Fiscal Year. This is the 17th year PWC has received this Certificate of Achievement.

"Transparency is an important component in fiscal responsibility and speaks to our core values of committing to excellence and doing the right thing."

Currently, PWC provides more than 274,101 services including electric, water, wastewater and irrigation. PWC's 650 employees are responsible for maintaining more than 1,400 miles of power lines and 2,825 miles of water and wastewater infrastructure. PWC's Annual Operating Budget this year is \$428.8 million. The bond ratings for PWC are Aa2 with Moody's and AA with both Standard & Poor's and Fitch.

Reminder: Summer Peak Time-of-Use

Beat the Peak and make Summer Time-of-Use (TOU) Rates work for you! Summer Peak will run through October between the hours of 3 p.m. – 7 p.m. Rates for electricity used during Off-Peak hours will cost 35% less than Peak and will occur 20 hours on weekdays and all day on weekends and PWC-observed holidays. Save Water (and Money) with Easy Irrigation Tips

July is Irrigation Awareness Month! Properly watering your landscape is one of the easiest ways you can save water. Do a weekly check on your sprinklers, to see if they are watering the landscape and not the sidewalk, walkways or streets. Many times, sprinkler heads are moved or the direction of the spray is altered due to water pressure changes or by lawnmowers. A simple check each week will help solve this common problem.

Please remember to:

- Follow Fayetteville PWC's Year-Round Outdoor Watering Schedule (see below for details)
- Water as needed, not just because it's your day
- Avoid watering during the heat of the day. Try watering before 9:00 a.m. or after 6:00 p.m.
- Check your irrigation controllers often since they can get accidently reset
- Take advantage of PWC's Rain Sensor Incentive Program & earn bill incentive (see below for details)
- If you live in a rental unit, talk to your landlord or management company if you notice the sprinklers are on frequently

Reap the Rewards of a Rain Sensor

Rain sensors are devices that can be attached to an automatic irrigation system to monitor rainfall levels. When a certain amount of rainfall is detected, the rain sensor temporarily overrides the controller to prevent unnecessary irrigation. Once the rain sensor dries out, the system operates according to the timer. A rain sensor can significantly reduce your water bill while benefiting both the customer and the community over time.

Fayetteville PWC's Rain Sensor Program runs through September 30, 2024. Water customers may purchase and install any new rain sensor to qualify for the incentive*. A bill credit of up to \$50 will be applied to utility bills after the rain sensor is installed. PWC's Fleet Department Repeats National Award

For a second year in a row, PWC's Fleet Maintenance has been recognized for outstanding operations by the NAFA Fleet Management Association. PWC was named 26th Best Fleet operations of the Top 100 in America.

The 100 Best program identifies and encourages the ever-increasing levels of performance improvement and innovation within the fleet industry. The goal of the 100 Best contest is to foster pride in the industry, build recognition within the national fleet community, increase levels of productivity and operational effectiveness and to encourage more individuals to consider fleet operations as a career choice.

PWC was rated on twelve performance measures to ultimately be named the 26th best operation, up from 30th last year. PWC received its highest marks in Use of Technology and Information, Staff Development, and Financial Management. Currently, eleven members of fleet hold ASE certifications from the National Institure of Automotive Service Excellence. Four employees hold Master Certifications, one has a double-master, two are Service Consultants, several have EPA 609 Refrigerant Systems Certifications and the fleet manager obtained his Certified Automotive Fleet Manager Certificate.
