With the summer sun beating down, you might be thinking of installing solar panels to help lower your energy cost. Whether you are a homeowner wanting to install solar panels, or a renter looking to participate in the community solar program, PWC puts the "able" in "Renewable".

Depending on the size of your solar panels, PWC offers two ways to receive credits on your monthly energy bill. If your solar array can generate 10kW or less, there is the "Renewable Energy Buy Back" option to sell excess energy back to PWC. For solar arrays larger than 10 kW, the "Buy All Sell All" option will keep you connected and reaping the rewards on your investment all year long.

If you choose to install roof-top solar, work with a reputable installer and have the proper electric permits and inspections. Have an interconnection agreement

signed with PWC before you connect and start receiving credit for the electricity you are generating. Remember, PWC does not partner with solar installation

companies. Be wary of sales pitches claiming to have exclusive deals with PWC.

Finally, for renters or customers unable to have solar panels on their home, PWC offers a community solar program. PWC electric customers who choose to subscribe to the service pay a monthly fee to support the maintenance and operations of the solar farm in exchange for a monthly bill credit based on the amount of energy generated by the solar farm.

Beat the Peak and make Summer Time-of-Use (TOU) Rates work for you! Summer Peak will run through October between the hours of 3 p.m. – 7 p.m. Rates for electricity used during Off-Peak hours will cost 35% less than Peak and will occur 20 hours on week-days and all day on weekends and PWC-observed holidays. Fayetteville PWC Makes it Easy to Charge Your EV



If you own a plug-in electric vehicle (or want to buy one), Fayetteville PWC makes it easy to keep your vehicle charged and ready to hit the open road. PWC's Whole Home and Whole Business rates might help you save money while charging your vehicle at home or business. The optional rate includes a Super Off-Peak window from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. daily when the energy cost is 44% to 47% lower than the Peak times. In exchange for a much lower Off-Peak rate, you'll see an increase in the basic facility charge and the Peak rate. If you drive your electric vehicle more than 16 miles a day, this plan may be right for you. Contact PWC Customer Service to see if the Whole Home or Whole Business rate is the right option for you.

South-Facing Windows...a Two-Way Door for Energy Conservation (ONSERVATION

When it is cold outside, south-facing windows are awesome.

They help keep the entire house snug and warm and let in tons of light. In fact, south-facing windows are best for lighting your home with natural, energy-efficient daylight. These windows let in the light all day long, and don't have as many problems with glare and heat as east and west-facing windows.

While fall is just around the corner, there will be plenty of warm days ahead until it gets here. Those lovely south-facing windows that keep a house so warm in the winter can also keep your A/C running in overdrive when it's hot outside. Don't worry though, there are several things you can do to reduce the amount of heat from the sun in your home (also known as solar gain).

For instance, it helps to use window coverings such as blinds or curtains, install awnings or sun-control films. You can also use plants for shade by planting deciduous trees in a location to cast shade on the south-facing windows. Indoor plants on the inside of the window provide some shade relief while giving the plants some much needed sunshine.

Trap It, Then Toss It and Keep Wipes Out of the Pipes!

Smart food disposal and refraining from putting items labeled "flushable" down the drain can help protect our environment, our sources of drinking water and your own property. Dumping grease, fats, and oil is not only illegal, but it can also cause sewage back-ups and flooding. Wipes labeled "flushable" don't break down in the system and can also cause blockages that lead to sewage back-ups which can damage personal and public property. Do your part to prevent such incidents by following these guidelines for proper food disposal. Trap your grease, fat, and oil – then toss it in the garbage!

DON'T depend on heavy-duty drain cleaners to fix a grease clog. While these cleaners can break up the clog initially, the grease will re-solidify further down the sewer lines/pipes and cause blockages for you and others.

DON'T dump cooking oil, poultry fat, and grease into the kitchen sink or the toilet bowl.

DO dispose of it in a sealed container and dispose of it in the garbage.

DO use paper towels to wipe residual grease or oil off dishes, pots and pans prior to washing them.

DO remember, the following items should never be flushed down the toilet:

- Wipes labelled "flushable" (they don't break down in the sanitary sewer system)
- sanitary sewer system)Baby wipes, diapers
- Paper towel
- Medications
- Dental floss
- Kitty litter
- Feminine hygiene products
- Prophylactics
- Any solid items that were not designed to be flushed down the toilet or drain.
