I. REGULAR BUSINESS

Chairman Donald Porter called the meeting of August 28, 2024, to order at 8:30 am.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Chairman Donald Porter led the Commission in the Pledge of Allegiance

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Commissioner Christopher Davis motioned to approve the agenda. Motion was seconded by Commissioner Ronna Rowe Garett and unanimously approved.

II. RECOGNITIONS AND AWARDS

LIGHT UP NAVAJO V

Presented by: Jonathan Rynne, Chief Operating Officer, Electrical Systems

Mr. Rynne stated he is happy to have 12 employees from our electric crews here today. These guys participated in a training and mutual aid event that is Light Up Navajo V . This is the fifth year that folks from Public Power have gone out to Arizona to assist the Navajo Tribal Utility Agency in providing electricity to people that have never had electricity in their history. Our guys were out there for two weeks.

Mr. Rynne played a short video of some of the PWC employees and the Navajo residents, expressing their gratitude to serve and to have experienced electricity for the first time in their homes.

Marc Tunstall, Director of Electric Construction and Maintenance stated this is the second time we sent our employees to assist with Light Up Navajo. He reiterated we sent twelve men and in the two weeks they were there, they built three miles of line and installed 66 poles and connected 10 homes to electricity. Mr. Tunstall stated the strange thing about this area is that a lot of it is sand or sandstone

and a lot of it is pure rock. Some days they were able to install only one pole and other days they were able to set 16 or 17 poles. Mr. Tunstall introduced the employees who participated in Light Up Navajo V this year.

Mr. Tunstall stated this is a great training effort and it is in a desolate part of our country. These guys are bringing power to the people, and we appreciate it.

The Commission and Liaisons expressed their thanks to all the employees who participated in Light Up Navajo V, bringing electricity to people who have never experienced it before.

KEY ACCOUNT AGENT RECOGNITION

Presented by: Carolyn Justice-Hinson, Chief Customer Officer

Ms. Justice Hinson stated that this morning she is here to share some recent accomplishments of the PWC Key Account Agents, Teddy Warner and Kenny Pierpoint, Mr. Warner and Mr. Pierpoint have earned their Key Account Certification from the American Public Power Association. Now, for those of you that are not familiar with the term key accounts, they are typically our largest customers. They make a significant economic impact as well as social impact in our community and again they tend to be our largest users of water and electric.

Ms. Justice-Hinson went on to state key accounts are not all industrial. We do have industrial and large commercial, but they are also the City, the County, our wholesale customers, and any customer that is an important local entity. Most of these customers typically have some type of unique need and if that need is not met, it can impact their operations and ultimately our economy. So our key account program here at PWC has 67 customers and they range from Goodyear, Cape Fear Valley Hospital to the Cumberland County Schools and because they are a priority, PWC has three key account agents that support them and they work to improve their services, communications and just build stronger relationships between them and PWC.

Once someone begins the APPA Certification Program they have one year to complete it, and in that timeframe Mr. Warner and Mr. Pierpoint completed their required curriculum and they both passed their certification exam. They were also required to submit and pass a customer action plan. They selected one of their accounts and showed how PWC would meet their needs. She noted that both Mr. Warner and Mr. Pierpoint have been here at PWC less than two years, and they were able to achieve this accomplishment within the two years. They are two of four employees who have earned their certificates from APPA.

The Commissioners congratulated Mr. Warner and Mr. Pierpoint on their accomplishments.

Bids were solicited from seven (7) vendors, and two (2) bids were received. The award is recommended to Mainlining America, LLC, Livingston, NJ, the lowest responsive, responsible bidder. PWC Procurement and Water Resource Engineering Departments request that the bid received from Insituform Technologies, LLC be rejected, as it was not conforming to PWC bid submittal requirements

C. Approve bid recommendation to award bid for the purchase of Substation Disconnect Switches to Royal Switchgear, Bessemer, AL, the lowest, responsive, responsible bidder, and in the best interests of PWC, in the total amount of \$247,046.00, and forward to City Council for approval.

COMMENTS: The bid notice was advertised through our usual channels on July 9, 2024, with a bid opening date of July 25, 2024. Bids were solicited from three (3) vendors, and four (4) bids were received. The award is recommended to Royal Switchgear, Bessemer, AL, the lowest responsive, responsible bidder. PWC Procurement and Electric Support Systems Departments request to reject the bids received from MindCore Technologies, Southern Electrical Equipment Company, Inc., Southern States, LLC, as these bidders' submittals were not conforming to PWC bid submittal requirements.

IV. NON-REVENUE WATER AND LEAK DETECTION PRESENTATION Presented by: Michael Smith, WR Engineering

Ms. Manning introduced Mr. Michael Smith, WR Asset Management Coordinator. Mr. Smith thanked the WR Construction Crews, the Laboratory as well as the following individuals for their help during this project. Kenny Hart, William McPhaul, Philip Parker, John Junto, Chad Groves, Harry Myles, Robert Turner, Corey Brown, and Terrence Thompson.

He stated In March of 2024, the second phase of the Non-Revenue Water Management/Leak Detection Program started with McKim & Creed. They provided the following services.

Acoustic Leak Detection Acoustic Leakage Inspection Technology (Correlators)

Leakage Pinpointing Technology Data Analytics

Design and implementation of a Non-Revenue Water (NRW) Assessment/Reduction Program

Acoustic Leak Detection Survey

McKin & Creed inspected the High-Pressure Water Zone (GTP, HTP, Ramsey, Murchison, and Bragg Boulevard Areas)

Foyetteville PWCLeak Detection Progress Map

- Potable water mains
- Water valves
- Fire hydrants
- Water service connections

Acoustic Leakage Inspection Technology used included:

Phocus 3Noise Loggers and Communication
 Module – this equipment Wirelessly detects and localizes water leakage for temporary, semi-permanent or permanent applications.

Mikron3 Kite Electronic Listening Stick and Ground Microphone - High acoustic sensitivity and multiple frequency range filters

Testing kits were used to help identify the chemical nature of the water source

Leakage Pinpointing Technology Used:

- Eureka 3 Real-time Acoustic Correlator Real-time correlator with advanced filtering system to pinpoint the most difficult leaks
- Enigma/3M Non-Real Time Acoustic Correlator Non-real-time correlating system for noisy, complex, or busy areas
- Enigma HY-Q With Hydrophone Adaptor Non-Real Time Acoustic Correlator Non-real-time correlating system further optimized for larger pipes and over longer distances

Water Leak Reports and Communication

- Leaks reported daily on a Water Asset Management Leak Card
- Potable water leaks requiring immediate action reported immediately to the Asset Management Coordinator

Findings

- 93% of the potable water leakage was not visible
- **30** water leaks were on fittings
- 21 water leaks were on fire hydrants or domestic/commercial water services
- 3 water leaks were discovered on water mains.

Reporting: ESRI GIS DASHBOARD

- **Environmental Systems Research** Institute (ESRI) GIS Dashboard used for data collection.
- Data Overlay allows for real time viewing

Findings:

- 54 water distribution leaks identified along 313.56 miles (Total System 1,422.40 miles)
- Estimated 154.8 gallons per minute (81,362,880 gallons per year)
- 65 suspected private side water leaks discovered (PWC's Conservation Specialists notified)
- 130 System notes identified on PWC's Assets

Results

54 out of the 54 water leaks discovered were repaired during normal work schedules





• Lost Revenue of \$355,555.79 per year (81,362,880 gallons of water at a cost of \$0.00437 per gallon)

PWC was very well represented at our ElectriCities Annual Conference. PWC was recognized for our 2023 Public Power Award of Excellence. The award of excellence encompasses how PWC strengthens public power; provides superior power; how we are customer centered with innovation and technology for our customers; as well as recognizing our people as our greatest asset. We will bring that award forward at a future meeting that formally recognizes our people who help make us proud and receive that award on our behalf.

Doing the right thing, and having the industry recognize us is so vitally important. It is not us thumping our chest out stating how good we are, but we have other folks recognizing us for the important work we do. This is important. Whether it is the awards we get at ElectriCities; or our guys and gals showing up helping to build others' systems for the first time, that is the biggest award.
