PWC Crews Come to our Neighbor's Aid

Two hurricanes struck our neighbors to the south and west in the past month. Multiple PWC crews were dispatched to provide aid and restore utility services to the impacted areas. PWC has mutual aid agreements in place with other utilities to both provide aid when requested, and to support PWC restoration efforts when we need it. Crews are only dispatched when a mutual aid partner requests assistance through



one of the state-level supporting organizations to ensure help goes where it is needed and to avoid hampering disaster response.



Prior to the arrival of Hurricane Helene, the City of Tallahassee, Florida, requested aid. In response, PWC sent two 5-man electric crews to Florida, before the storm made landfall. After the crews completed helping to restore services there, they then reported to South Carolina, to help with restoration efforts there. One crew worked in Abbeville, South Carolina, while the other crew helped in Greenwood, South Carolina.

On October 9th, PWC received a request from Black Mountain, North Carolina, for water crews to help restore drinking water and sanitary sewer services in one of the hardest-hit areas of

Western North Carolina. PWC sent two 5-man crews and a supervisor to join other utility crews to restore services and a second pair of crews relieved them at the end of October. This is the first time PWC has received a mutual aid request for water crews.



In response to Hurricane Milton, on October 10th, a PWC electric crew responded to a mutual aid request in Orlando, FL. The crews played an active role in restoring power there after the storm knocked power out for more than 3 million customers in Florida.

Reminder: Timeof-Use Winter **Peak Hours Start November 1st**

Winter Peak Time-of-Use hours begin November 1st and run through March. Shift as much energy to Off-Peak (outside of 6-10 am weekdays) for the most savings. Electricity used during Off-Peak hours cost 35% less than Peak. The lower Off-Peak rate occurs 20 hours each weekday and all day on weekends and PWC observed holidays. Make Heat Pumps Work for You

Heat Pumps are the most common and efficient form of electric heating in moderate climates like ours. Heat pumps use refrigerant to absorb heat from the air outside (yes, even when it's cold!) to warm your home instead of "making" heat like traditional furnaces or baseboard heaters.

With cold weather looming, these useful tips may help you save energy and money on your bills as you make the switch to heating your home.

- Set your thermostat to 68°F when you're home and turn it down at night or when you're out. A programmable thermostat can help you manage these adjustments. Remember, because heat pumps are using outside air, you will use more energy as the gap between the outside temps and your thermostat setting widens.
- Turn up your heat gradually no more than two degrees at a time to keep your heat pump's auxiliary heat, or "heat strips", from coming on. Auxiliary heat costs three times as much to operate, but keep in mind auxiliary heat will automatically come on as temperatures reach freezing and below.
- If your heat pump is more than 10 years old, consider replacing it with an ENERGY STAR® certified system. PWC electric customers can take advantage of our HVAC incentive program and earn up to \$400 in bill credits for installing an ENERGY STAR heat pump, plus additional credits for replacing duct work and/or improving insulation.

Save during the Holidays

As the holiday season nears and you prepare for festivities, now is a good time to consider simple habits to reduce water consumption around the home. Whether you've finalized the holiday menu or are preparing to order-in, here are some simple conservation tips to start and share with friends and family:

- Defrost frozen foods without water. Leaving the faucet on to defrost a frozen ham or turkey will waste water. Instead, let your frozen items defrost overnight in the fridge.
- If you have a dishwasher, use it. Washing full loads of dishes in a dishwasher saves 5-15 gallons per load and uses significantly less water than washing by hand.
- Garbage disposals are not good for your pipes, septic tanks, or the municipal sewer system. The best way to tackle food scraps is to compost or throw them in the trash.
- Rinse veggies and fruits without running the faucet. Fill a large bowl or pan with water to rinse vegetables and fruits rather than running the tap. After rinsing, use leftover water to water houseplants, including a live Christmas tree if you have one.
- Inspect your bathroom fixtures for malfunctions and leaks before your guests arrive. During the holidays, bathrooms are likely to experience heavier usage than normal, which can lead to more issues.
- Run a full load of laundry. Laundry can increase with table linens and sheets and towels for quests over the holidays. Save time, energy, and water by washing items together in cold water. Information courtesy of saveourwater.com
