Don't Let Summer Run Up Your Utility Bill

The high temperatures of Summer are in the forecast, which can have a big impact on your bill. A few simple conservation tips can add up and help make a difference.

Electrical Bill:

- Turn off the lights when not in use and use LED lightbulbs
- Keep the thermostat at the highest comfortable level in the summer and use a fan to blow air on you to stay cool
- Reduce hot water usage. Shorter showers and running your clothes washer with cold water make a big impact
- Use window blinds or drapes or other window coverings to help windows keep out the temperatures from the outside
- Make sure your AC unit is maintained per manufacturer's recommendations and air filters are replaced on schedule
- Be mindful of summer peak hours. **Peak Time-of-Use Rates, when energy is in high demand and the most expensive, are seven days a week from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m.**

Water and Sewer Bill:

- Make sure you turn the outside faucets off after watering plants and flowers
- Check your backflow and sprinkler system for leaks
- Install a rain sensor for your sprinkler system if you don't have one
- Avoid watering plants at midday, as more heat and evaporation require more water for hydration
